## A BILL

To establish a grant program to support schools of medicine and schools of osteopathic medicine in underserved areas.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Expanding Medical
- 5 Education Act".

SEC. 2. GRANTS FOR SCHOOLS OF MEDICINE AND SCHOOLS
OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE IN UNDER-
SERVED AREAS.
Subpart II of part C of title VII of the Public Health
Service Act (42 U.S.C. 293m et seq.) is amended by add-
ing at the end the following:
"SEC. 749C. GRANTS FOR SCHOOLS OF MEDICINE AND
SCHOOLS OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE IN UN-
DERSERVED AREAS.
"(a) In General.—The Secretary may award grants
to institutions of higher education (including consortiums
of such institutions) for the establishment, improvement,
or expansion of a school of medicine or osteopathic medi-
cine, or a branch campus of a school of medicine or osteo-
pathic medicine.
"(b) Priority.—In selecting grant recipients under
this section, the Secretary shall give priority to any insti-
tution of higher education (or consortium of such institu-
tions) that—
"(1) proposes to use the grant for the establish-
ment of a school of medicine or osteopathic medi-
cine, or a branch campus of a school of medicine or
osteopathic medicine, in an area—
"(A) in which—
"(i) no other such school is based; or

1	"(11) in the case in which the school o
2	medicine or osteopathic medicine proposed
3	to be established would be a minority-serv
4	ing institution, no other minority-serving
5	institution that includes a school of medi
6	cine or osteopathic medicine is based; and
7	"(B) that is a medically underserved com
8	munity or a health professional shortage area
9	or
10	"(2) is a minority-serving institution described
11	in section 371(a) of the Higher Education Act o
12	1965 or an institution or program described in sec
13	tion 326(e) of such Act.
14	"(c) Considerations.—In awarding grants under
15	this section, the Secretary, to the extent practicable, may
16	ensure equitable distribution of awards among the geo
17	graphical regions of the United States.
18	"(d) USE OF FUNDS.—An institution of higher edu
19	cation (or a consortium of such institutions)—
20	"(1) shall use grant amounts received under
21	this section to—
22	"(A) recruit, enroll, and retain medica
23	students who are pursuing a degree of doctor o
24	medicine or doctor of osteopathy, including in
25	dividuals who are from disadvantaged back

1	grounds (including racial and ethnic groups
2	underrepresented among medical students and
3	health professions), individuals from rural and
4	underserved areas, low-income individuals, and
5	first generation college students, at a school of
6	medicine or osteopathic medicine or branch
7	campus of a school of medicine or osteopathic
8	medicine; and
9	"(B) develop, implement, and expand cur-
10	riculum that emphasizes care for rural and un-
11	derserved populations, including accessible and
12	culturally and linguistically appropriate care
13	and services, at such school or branch campus;
14	and
15	"(2) may use grant amounts received under this
16	section to—
17	"(A) plan and construct—
18	"(i) a school of medicine or osteo-
19	pathic medicine, or a branch campus of a
20	school of medicine or osteopathic medicine,
21	in an area in which no other such school
22	is based; or
23	"(ii) a school of medicine or osteo-
24	pathic medicine, or a branch campus of a
25	school of medicine or osteopathic medicine,

1	that will be a minority-serving institution
2	in an area in which no other such school
3	that is a minority-serving institution is
4	based;
5	"(B) plan, develop, and meet criteria for
6	accreditation for a school of medicine or osteo-
7	pathic medicine or branch campus of a school
8	of medicine or osteopathic medicine;
9	"(C) hire faculty, including faculty from
10	racial and ethnic groups who are underrep-
11	resented among the medical and other health
12	professions, and other staff to serve at such a
13	school or branch campus;
14	"(D) support educational programs at such
15	a school or branch campus;
16	"(E) modernize and expand infrastructure
17	at such a school or branch campus; and
18	"(F) support other activities that the Sec-
19	retary determines further the establishment
20	improvement, or expansion of a school of medi-
21	cine or osteopathic medicine or branch campus
22	of a school of medicine or osteopathic medicine
23	"(e) Application.—To be eligible to receive a grant
24	under subsection (a), an institution of higher education
25	(or a consortium of such institutions), shall submit an ap-

- 1 plication to the Secretary at such time, in such manner,
- 2 and containing such information as the Secretary may re-
- 3 quire, including a description of the institution's or con-
- 4 sortium's planned activities described in subsection (d).

## 5 "(f) Reporting.—

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- "(1) REPORTS FROM ENTITIES.—Each institution of higher education, or consortium of such institutions, awarded a grant under this section shall submit an annual report to the Secretary on the activities conducted under such grant, and other information as the Secretary may require.
- "(2) Report to congress.—Not later than 5 years after the date of enactment of this section and every 5 years thereafter, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of the Senate and the Committee on Energy and Commerce of the House of Representatives a report that provides a summary of the activities and outcomes associated with grants made under this section. Such reports shall include—
  - "(A) a list of awardees, including their primary geographic location, and location of any school of medicine or osteopathic medicine, or a branch campus of school of medicine or osteo-

1	pathic medicine that was established, improved
2	or expanded under this program;
3	"(B) the total number of students (includ-
4	ing the number of students from racial and eth-
5	nic groups underrepresented among medical
6	students and health professions, low-income
7	students, and first generation college students)
8	who—
9	"(i) are enrolled at or who have grad-
10	uated from any school of medicine or os-
11	teopathic medicine, or a branch campus of
12	school of medicine or osteopathic medicine
13	that was established, improved, or ex-
14	panded under this program, deidentified
15	and disaggregated by race, ethnicity, age,
16	sex, geographic region, disability status
17	and other relevant factors, to the extent
18	such information is available; and
19	"(ii) who subsequently participate in
20	an accredited internship or medical resi-
21	dency program upon graduation from any
22	school of medicine or osteopathic medicine
23	or a branch campus of a school of medicine
24	or osteopathic medicine, that was estab-
25	lished, improved, or expanded under this

1	program, deidentified and disaggregated by
2	race, ethnicity, age, sex, geographic region,
3	disability status, medical specialty pursued,
4	and other relevant factors, to the extent
5	such information is available;
6	"(C) the effects of such program on the
7	health care provider workforce, including any
8	impact on demographic representation
9	disaggregated by race, ethnicity, and sex, and
10	the fields or specialties pursued by students
11	who have graduated from any school of medi-
12	cine or osteopathic medicine, or a branch cam-
13	pus of school of medicine or osteopathic medi-
14	cine, that was established, improved, or ex-
15	panded under this program;
16	"(D) the effects of such program on health
17	care access in underserved areas, including
18	medically underserved communities and health
19	professional shortage areas; and
20	"(E) recommendations for improving the
21	program described in this section, and any
22	other considerations as the Secretary deter-
23	mines appropriate.
24	"(3) Public availability.—The Secretary
25	shall make reports submitted under paragraph (2)

1	publicly available on the website of the Department
2	of Health and Human Services.
3	"(g) Definitions.—In this section:
4	"(1) Branch campus.—
5	"(A) IN GENERAL.—The term 'branch
6	campus', with respect to a school of medicine or
7	osteopathic medicine, means an additional loca-
8	tion of such school that is geographically apart
9	and independent of the main campus, at which
10	the school offers at least 50 percent of the pro-
11	gram leading to a degree of doctor of medicine
12	or doctor of osteopathy that is offered at the
13	main campus.
14	"(B) Independence from main cam-
15	PUS.—For purposes of subparagraph (A), the
16	location of a school described in such subpara-
17	graph shall be considered to be independent of
18	the main campus described in such subpara-
19	graph if the location—
20	"(i) is permanent in nature;
21	"(ii) offers courses in educational pro-
22	grams leading to a degree, certificate, or
23	other recognized educational credential;
24	"(iii) has its own faculty and adminis-
25	trative or supervisory organization; and

1	"(iv) has its own budgetary and hiring
2	authority.
3	"(2) First generation college student.—
4	The term 'first generation college student' has the
5	meaning given such term in section 402A(h)(3) of
6	the Higher Education Act of 1965.
7	"(3) Health professional shortage
8	AREA.—The term 'health professional shortage area
9	has the meaning given such term in section 332(a)
10	"(4) Institution of higher education.—
11	The term 'institution of higher education' has the
12	meaning given such term in section 101 of the High-
13	er Education Act of 1965.
14	"(5) Medically underserved community.—
15	The term 'medically underserved community' has the
16	meaning given such term in section 799B(6).
17	"(h) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
18	is authorized to be appropriated such sums as may be nec-
19	essary to carry out this section.".
