LOWERING THE COST OF Rx DRUGS FOR VIRGINIANS




In August 2022, Kaine voted for the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)*, which passed by one vote.

The IRA is impacting:

- <u>36,461</u> Virginians on Medicare who use insulin and are now being charged no more than \$35 per month for an insulin prescription. This is an average annual savings of \$510 per person;
- In 2023, nearly <u>234,000</u> Medicare Part D enrollees in Virginia received a recommended Part D covered vaccine with no cost sharing, which represents 21 percent of the Commonwealths total Part D population.
- <u>11,655</u> low-income seniors in Virginia who qualify for additional help to cover the cost of their prescription drugs.

390,400 Virginians are projected to save an average <u>\$440.62 per year</u> thanks to the IRA's \$2,000 annual outof-pocket cost cap, effective in 2025.



Senator Kaine's Other Work to Lower Prescription Drug Costs:

- Successfully passed the bipartisan *Biologics Market Transparency Act*, to <u>strengthen the pipeline and</u> <u>increase transparency for critical medicines</u>, and the *Interchangeable Biologics Clarity Act*, to <u>more efficiently</u> <u>usher drugs to the market by making key improvements to the Food and Drug Administration's review</u> <u>process for interchangeable biosimilars</u>.
- <u>Voted</u> to successfully pass out of the Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) Committee the bipartisan *Pharmacy Benefit Manager Reform Act*, legislation to lower drug costs. That bill included his bipartisan <u>Patient Right to Shop Act</u> to help ensure patients can access pricing tools to compare prices before paying for a prescription.
- Introduced the bipartisan <u>HELP Copays Act</u>, which would protect patients from harmful insurance and Pharmacy Benefit Manager practices that raise out-of-pocket drug costs.
