Longwood University	Facility upgrades to preserve a building that is a National Historic Landmark and on the National Register of Historic Places.	Farmville VA	\$500
Frederick County Sanitation Authority	To fund construction of a water treatment facility at the location of an existing public water supply well that has not been developed for use as a drinking water source.	Frederick County VA	\$3,600
City of Norfolk	To fund replacement of approximately 2600 linear feet of aging gravity sewer and water mains in a predominately residential neighborhood of approximately 4,200 residents adjacent to Broad Creek and Elizabeth River waterways. Recurring collapses of the sanitary sewer system in this neighborhood represents an environmental hazard and impacts residential access to reliable water and sewer service.	Norfolk VA	\$2,536
City of Norfolk	To fund replacement of approximately 2500 linear feet of gravity sewer and water mains that were installed in the 1940s and 1950s in the West Ocean View neighborhood of Northside in Norfolk. Federal funding would be used for construction of the water and sewer improvements including labor, equipment, and installation of materials. The new water and sewer will provide reliable services to the residents for the next century as well as reduce the potential for environmental impacts from sewer overflows.	Norfolk VA	\$2,344
Danville Pittsylvania County	To fund aspects of the park to include rough grading, stormwater system drainage, sanitary sewer and water service, fine grading, retaining walls, and irrigation efforts.	Pittsylvania County VA	\$2,500
Town of Pulaski	Complete architectural and engineering design including comprehensive construction documents for the entire building (except the childcare center) and preservation construction activities in the entire facade and front section of the building.	Pulaski VA	\$500
City of Richmond	To fund part of the City of Richmond's \$33 million interim plan to address \$850 million in Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) needs. Richmond is one of over 700 cities in the US with combined sewers and the largest combined sewer system in the Commonwealth. During heavy rains these sewers overflow and adversely impact water quality in the James River.	Richmond VA	\$9,200
Town of Saltville	To fund the completion of cleanup activities on the former Town Shop property in the Town of Saltville, Virginia. This funding request would complete a critical step for redevelopment of a 56-acre brownfield site. The town plans to convert this site into a recreation hub that will drive economic development. U.S. Forest Service	To allow the U.S. Forest Service to complete acquisition of priority parcels of land for conservation as part of the George Washington and Jefferson National Forests. The current parcels targeted for acquisition using these funds are: Dry Run Appalachian Trail, Straight Fork, and Iron Mountain. The 1.8 million-acre GWJNF are located primarily in Virginia and expand into West Virginia and Kentucky. The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) remains critical to protecting the GWJNF's environmentally sensitive lands, recreational opportunities, and preventing development incompatible with management of GWJNF lands. City of Williamsburg	Funds will be used for stream bank stabilization and wetlands protection.
